<p>Write a letter to your future-self. For example, you can ask questions about what life is like in the future, describe a day in your life at the moment to your future self, or explain about the virus.</p>	<p>Write a set of instructions for washing your hands. You should all be experts on this one by now!</p>	<p>Now it's starting to get easier to get ingredients, try some baking. Then see if you can remember the whole recipe and instructions from memory.</p>	<p>Write a senses poem about what is outside your window at home. It could also be a shape poem!</p>
<p>How many things can you find in your house that start with the initial letter of your name? Or with every letter of your name?</p>	<p>Draw out North/East/South/ West using chalk/paper labels- practice giving instructions on how to move in those directions, including how many steps, anti/clockwise. What is N/E/S/W of where someone is standing? Write down the language you have used.</p>	<p>Download FMS logo (it's free) and impress your family with your algorithm writing. Write a procedure to draw a square and use a repeat, or write your name using the penup and pendown commands to move the cursor.</p>	<p>Show someone at home how you would say, draw, explain 4x5. What ways could you represent it in pictures etc? Pick some more numbers from the 2, 5 or 10 times table to do the same with.</p>
<p>Find out about Stonehenge and create your own information book or leaflet. Think about the persuasive language we used for our river cruises.</p>	<p>Make your own miniature version of Stonehenge.</p>	<p>Write your own story about anything you fancy! It could be set in the past e.g. on Titanic, or during the Great Fire of London. Alternatively it could be set in the present, about adventures in lockdown. Or maybe a Magic Key adventure or the Faraway Tree. Use your imagination but don't forget to plan it first!</p>	<p>Use rocks, stones and other natural materials to create a picture. You might wish to look at the work of Andrew Goldsworthy for inspiration.</p>
<p>Draw a scale map of your street. What houses are there? Are they all the same size? Do they have gardens? Are there shops? Play parks? Label and make a key.</p>	<p>Draw the view outside one of your windows at home. Try to draw it with perspective. Label what features are human (manmade) or physical (natural).</p>	<p>Create a collage of the view outside your window at home. Use interesting materials to create different textures. They could be natural materials collected from outside, or things from inside the house.</p>	<p>Describe/ draw how you think the view from your window might change over the next 10 years. It doesn't have to be right- we can't tell what will really happen!</p>
